GROUP INFORMATION

The Holocaust Education and Genocide Prevention Foundation (formerly as Kleinmann Family Foundation) was founded in 1993 by Holocaust survivor Peter Kleinmann and Naomi Kramer, who remains President to this day. She has devoted her life to researching and teaching the history of the Holocaust. In 1994 she was invited by Dr. Kurt Scholz, President of the Viennese School Board, to create a week-long symposium educating teachers from former communist countries including Romania, Hungary, Czechoslovakia on the topic of Holocaust education. Naomi is an active member of the Jewish Community of Montreal and has brought many other members in for consultation on this project, including numerous Holocaust survivors, school boards, academics, and members of diverse communities from around Canada. In 2019 Naomi received the Gold Medal of Honour for Services to the Republic of Austria, in 2022 the Decoration of Merit in Gold from the Austrian Canadian Council, and in 2023 the Austrian Holocaust Memorial Award.

Recently, the HEGP Foundation has begun working with representatives of Canada's Indigenous communities to adapt this project and bring it to more rural areas in the North.

The Jewish Community Foundation of Montreal and the Bissell Family Foundation have each contributed financially for both the initial implementation of *Misinformation and Disinformation: Down the Rabbit Hole* and for the second phase the Canadian Government is currently reviewing a request for funding.

The HEGP Foundation has also been a partner of the Gedenkdienst program since its inception in 1995. Gedenkdieners, with their youthful perspectives and invaluable input, encourage participation with students.
